Few have truly discovered music in a way you can, as Neil has pointed out, feel it. The journey takes a bit of effort, some good equipment and quality source that is as close to the microphone as possible; less is more when processing recorded music. With 'To Feel the Music', Neil Young and Phil Baker give fans unprecedented access, inviting them to journey alongside them as they step back into the spotlight to speak out on behalf of music lovers everywhere. Fueled by the passion and creativity that has inspired millions for more than four decades, Young shares his perspective on transforming today's musical landscape.
